### INFORMATION

## District Perspective

Edmonton Public Schools strives to provide an outstanding education in our pursuit of strong student achievement. High quality learning environments and programs are essential to achieving that goal because they give staff and students the opportunity to excel in teaching and learning. Like many school districts in the province, we struggle to meet our facility objectives with the funding available. In this environment of scarce financial support, we must carefully consider our approach to facility management and prioritize where to direct our limited resources. Our annual planning process includes three tools to achieve this goal:

- The Ten-Year Facilities Plan, which determines how the district will make facility decisions:
- The Three-Year Capital Plan, which determines what the district capital priorities will be; and
- The Annual Implementation Plan, which assesses the viability of all district schools on a yearly basis and recommends strategies for managing them.

The provincial government requires that all school districts submit a ten-year facilities plan and a three-year capital plan every year. The current Edmonton Public Schools' Ten-Year Facilities Plan (2007-2016) is the product of careful analysis and extensive consultation with stakeholders. An electronic version of both plans is available on the district's website at www.epsb.ca. In addition to these two planning tools, the district has developed the Annual Implementation Plan to further enhance our work.

### Facility Challenges in the District

Edmonton Public Schools is the second largest school district in Alberta, with over 80,000 students between Kindergarten and Grade 12, approximately 32,000 continuing education students, 199 schools and over 7,000 staff. The size of our district and rapidly changing city create some significant facility challenges which include:

- More school space than required.
- Space concentrated in areas with few students.
- Significant renovation required in many school facilities.
- Insufficient space in new areas of the city.

Edmonton Public Schools has a mandate to use existing space efficiently and effectively because funding for operating and maintaining schools and for capital projects is related directly to the amount of space used rather than the total district inventory of space. Left unmanaged, these factors will lead to a loss of provincial funding and impair the outstanding education that our students currently enjoy. Finding ways to address these difficulties is critical work. It begins with understanding the City of Edmonton's changing demographics, Edmonton Public Schools inventory of buildings and provincial funding formulas.

### School Age Population

Edmonton Public Schools uses census information from the civic, provincial and federal governments, as well as Alberta Health Care to determine facility needs. The City of Edmonton's Population and Employment Forecast Allocation Summary Report 2003-2030 indicated that the overall school age population will continue to decline until approximately 2015. However, a slight increase in student enrolment was realized at the start of the 2006-2007 school year. The reason for the unexpected increase in enrolment is attributed to an increase in migration to Edmonton, significant enough to impact student enrolment. In addition, birth rates in Alberta are projected to increase.

Using this new data, the number of school-aged children in newer suburban neighbourhoods is growing and may continue to grow if current economic conditions remain vibrant. At present, district schools are concentrated in the city's older, more established areas. Because we have more space where there are fewer students, students living in the city's newer areas must be transported by bus or private vehicles to schools toward the inner part of the city. This is both expensive and inconvenient. Currently, twenty-five per cent of the district's elementary students live in neighbourhoods without a local elementary school.

The City is currently exploring opportunities to provide affordable housing and intensify developed areas of the city, however, these are not areas with declining enrolment in the city core. This initiative may marginally increase student enrolment in these areas, but with the limited amount of land available for redevelopment and the trend for families to live in single family dwellings, the amount of unused school space in these neighbourhoods will not be significantly impacted. The areas the City is considering also continue to have a stable number of students unlike areas in the city center core.

### Sector Based Planning

A challenge faced by all of Alberta's larger urban centres is to provide equal access to quality learning environments and viable facilities. To address this challenge, a sector based planning model was adopted and the district established ten planning sectors, nine of which

are geographically based and the tenth sector consists of all the high schools in the city and is not geographically-based. In general, sectors with mature neighbourhoods have more student spaces than students and sectors with new or developing neighbourhoods have fewer student spaces than required. This creates a situation where many students must be transported from their local communities to attend schools or programs in other areas of the city.

### Individual School Profiles

A quality learning environment includes both a high quality school facility and the necessary enrolment to maximize educational programming opportunities for students and teachers. The viability of all district schools is assessed every year through the Annual Implementation Plan. The analysis begins with the preparation of Individual School Profiles which include the following components:

- student enrolment
- Edmonton Public Schools population
- student space and cost
- facility information and condition
- location and accessibility
- local conditions
- facility strategy and timelines

The information provided in the school profiles is a snapshot based on current information about a school. Benchmarks were identified for each of the components listed above in order to measure a school's viability. A facility strategy was then recommended for each school based on the results of applying the benchmarks to the Individual School Profile. Facility Strategies can include leaving things as they are; renovating or leasing space; re-locating programs, grades or boundaries; or sustainability reviews and program fit reviews. ## Annual Implementation Plan - Sustainability and Program Fit Reviews

The district's Annual Implementation Plan was approved by the Board of Trustees on October 10, 2006. The plan identified schools to be reviewed during the 2006-07 school year. The following schools are currently undergoing sustainability or program fit reviews: Coronation, Grovenor, High Park, Lendrum, Montrose, Mount Royal, Newton, Mount Pleasant, Mill Creek/Ritchie schools.

A copy of the flow chart outlining the *Public Engagement Process for Sustainability and Program Fit Reviews* is attached (Appendix I). The review process was developed in consultation with parents and community members as part of our ongoing effort to give advance notice regarding schools where sustainability may be of concern, and to enable communities to have meaningful input into decisions affecting schools. Schools identified for sustainability or program fit reviews could be recommended for one or more of the following:

- relocation of one or more programs in or out of a school
- adjusting grade configuration by moving grades in or out of a school

- re-designating attendance areas or alternative program boundaries
- creating multi campus sites by combining individual schools
- program change
- adjustment of enrolment limits
- school or program closure
- status quo

It should be noted that the movement of three or more consecutive grades entirely is subject to a school closure process in accordance with the Closure of Schools Regulation under the School Act.

## **Public Engagement Opportunities**

A calendar of meetings for sustainability and program fit reviews outlining purpose and dates of meetings is attached (Appendix II). An initial school visit and walkthrough took place at each school with principals to share information, gather additional data, and to discuss the public engagement process.

Meetings took place at each school with staff, and with school council's to share data and information, gather feedback, and discuss membership on Scenario Development Teams. PowerPoint presentations for each of the school meetings are on the district's web-site.

Parents, staff, and community members were identified and invited to serve on the schools Scenario Development Team by the principal. The roles and responsibilities of Scenario Development Teams are outlined as follows:

- To act as a representative of the voices of parents and community
- To develop an understanding of the accommodation needs and demands
- To develop scenarios based on areas, the surrounding community and school needs
- To identify opportunities and challenges associated with each scenario
- To share scenarios, including identified opportunities and challenges with the parents and community at a public engagement meeting
- To gather feedback on the scenarios to identify any additional opportunities and/or challenges

Two Scenario Development Team meetings were conducted at each school during the period from October 24 to November 20, 2006. During the first meeting, teams identified potential scenarios for these schools.

At the second meeting, Scenario Development Teams reviewed and confirmed the draft scenarios and identified opportunities and challenges for each proposal.

During the scenario development process team members were encouraged to discuss the ideas and progress with their respective group being parents, staff, or community members.


### Sustainability and Program Fit Reports

Attachments I through IX represent a more detailed view of information and data than the individual schools profiles provide and include the district and sector context that schools under review impact. Outcomes of sustainability and program fit reviews have not been

determined and Public Engagement Meetings are in progress. Once completed, the administration will review feedback from participants and gather additional data necessary to develop a recommendation to be presented to board in January, 2007. Recommended outcomes could be implemented in one school year or phased in over more than one school year.

## BACKGROUND INFORMATION FOR THE CORONATION SCHOOL SUSTAINABILITY REVIEW

### Rationale for Inclusion of Coronation School for a Sustainability Review

When a district comparison of school profiles was completed, most schools met more benchmarks than Coronation School, and the margin between the actual numbers at Coronation School and the benchmarks was greater than at most district schools. Based on this analysis it was determined that Coronation School faced many challenges and needed to be reviewed as part of a Sustainability Review. Specifically, Coronation School Enrolment data indicates that 88 students have enrolled for the 2006/2007 year including 70 mainstream students. Less than 25 per cent of students living in the Coronation School attendance area attend Coronation School. Less than 60 per cent of Coronation School is being utilized according to the provincial formula for calculating school utilization. The facility condition information shows a score of 390 on the 1999 Provincial Facility Audit Score, and only a rating of marginal on the recent District Capital Inspections. There are six other schools in the surrounding area with available space. Coronation's School Profile is attached as Appendix I.

The next section of this report will take a closer look at Coronation School and how the school interfaces in the surrounding area and in the district. The intent is to provide as much information as possible about the school in order to make decisions for the future.

### CORONATION ELEMENTARY SCHOOL 10925 - 139 STREET

### Instructional Focus

Coronation School's Instructional Focus is a school-wide effort towards all students demonstrating growth in reading comprehension across the curriculum. Assessment for learning, guided reading, 6+1 Write Traits, using quality children's literature to enhance reading and writing strategies, and daily access to the library, are some of the key strategies utilized to increase student achievement. Student growth in reading and writing will be measured by the district HLAT tests, the Provincial Achievement tests, school base performance assessments and progress through leveled books.

### LOCAL CONDITIONS

Local Conditions as submitted by the Principal in consultation with parents, staff, and community members.

Coronation School has an active, supportive parent group and community. There is a strong focus on academic success and citizenship. This is supported through a technology lab, technology in the classroom and library, an extensive collection of children's literature and research material, an outdoor classroom with all flora native to Alberta, and within walking distance - the Telus World of Science. We have the IB Middle Years Program in grade 6 and French as a second language is offered to the students in grades 4-6. Student leadership is emphasized through a variety of leadership opportunities such as student announcers, patrols, secretaries, referees, Club Moo volunteers, and a computer team. Physical fitness is supported by a horizontal climbing wall in the gymnasium, the school playground, the basketball area, the tarmac game area, the large sport fields, and extra-curricular activities throughout the year. In addition it is within walking proximity of the community skating rink and playground, a swimming pool, and sports fields.

# CURRENT ENROLMENT, ORGANIZATION, STUDENT POPULATION AND PROJECTED ENROLMENT DATA

The following section addresses the organization for instruction of Coronation School. Listed are the current programs in the school, any district sites, and the grade organization employed to meet the challenges of the declining enrolment, and student aged population.

### **District Sites**

- Behaviour Learning Assistance Program (BLA) Programming for students with severe behaviour disorders is provided at all levels. Students are served in local schools and in district centres. Programming focuses on learning behavioural control and pro-social skills as well as academic development.
- Behaviour Learning Assistance / Opportunity Program (BLA/OPP) Programming for students with behaviour disorders in combination with developmental delays. Students are served in local schools and in district centres. Programming focuses on learning behavioural control and pro-social skills as well as academic development.




- The attendance area for the regular program at Coronation School consists of the North Glenora neighbourhood and the dual designated neighbourhood of McQueen. Students residing in the McQueen neighbourhood are also counted in the High Park School attendance area.
  - o There are a total of 179 students residing in the Coronation School attendance area consisting of:
  - o 81 students residing in the North Glenora neighbourhood
  - o 98 students residing in the McQueen neighbourhood
  - o A total of 43 of these students attend Coronation School.
- McQueen School was closed in 1984 and students were designated to either Coronation School or High Park School.

The pie chart that follows indicates where these students currently attend. As shown, Coronation School only has a population of 179 students in its designated attendance area.

### Facility Condition

Coronation School received a provincial facility audit score of 390 in 1999. Edmonton Public Schools internal District Capital Inspection rated the facility as marginal. The following factors contribute to the marginal rating. The mechanical system, washrooms, and exterior doors have reached the end of their usable life and need to be replaced. In addition, the steam heating system needs to be converted to hot water heating, and the washroom fixtures and lighting fixtures need to be upgraded. As such, Coronation School poses no immediate threat to the health and safety of students. Since 1990, records indicate that Facilities Services and the school have cumulatively spent \$434,539 on modifications and upgrades. Highlights include \$218,350 spent on replacing windows in 2001 and \$56,779 on classroom flooring in 1999.

The following chart explains the condition rating guide currently in use by the province in re-audits and the district for inspections:

To meet 1990 Barrier Free Accessibility Codes, Coronation School requires moderate modifications to provide washrooms, ramps and lifts.

#### Site Conditions and Amenities


Coronation School is located on non-reserve land, which the district owns, with no other school facility adjacent to the site.

The playground at Coronation School was built in 2000 and was funded with parent group support. The park and playground at North Glenora is also accessible for special events and as an outdoor classroom.

### LOCATION, ACCESSIBILITY AND SECTOR INFORMATION

Coronation School is located in the West 1 Sector that includes mature neighbourhoods and new and developing neighbourhoods. A map of West 1 Sector is attached as Appendix II.

- There are two other schools located in the West 1 Sector that are also undergoing Sustainability Reviews. They are Grovenor School and High Park School.
- There are six schools in a 1.6 km radius where student learning space is available. They are Glenora, Grovenor, Westglen, Westminster, Westmount and Woodcroft.
- There are 4,273 elementary and junior high students living in West 1 Sector.
- There are 13,042 provincially rated student spaces in West 1 Sector.
- Eighty-seven per cent of students living in this sector are enrolled at schools located in West 1 Sector, and 13 per cent are enrolled outside the sector at their designated receiving school, or at other schools offering regular and district alternative and special education programs.
- Fifty-one per cent of students enrolled in West 1 Sector live outside of the sector.
- Many district alternative and special education programs are found within the West 1 Sector. These programs enhance the viability of many West 1 Sector schools.
- Major capital investment in West 1 Sector schools will be contingent upon confirmation of their long-term viability.




# **Current and Future Residential Development**

### BACKGROUND INFORMATION FOR THE GROVENOR SCHOOL SUSTAINABILITY REVIEW

### Rationale for Inclusion of Grovenor School for a Sustainability Review

When a district comparison of school profiles was completed, most schools met more benchmarks than Grovenor School, and the margin between the actual numbers at Grovenor School and the benchmarks was greater than at most district schools. Based on this analysis it was determined that Grovenor School faced many challenges and needed to be reviewed as part of a Sustainability Review. Grovenor School Enrolment data indicates that 76 students have enrolled for the 2006/2007 year including 67 mainstream students. Only 30 per cent of students living in the Grovenor School attendance area attend Grovenor School. Less than 40 per cent of Grovenor School is being utilized according to the provincial formula for calculating school utilization. The facility information and condition section shows a score of 500 on the 1999 Provincial Facility Audit Score, and only a rating of 'marginal' on the recent District Capital Inspections. There are four other schools in the surrounding area with available space. Grovenor's School Profile is attached as Appendix I.





## • Facility Condition

Grovenor School received a provincial facility audit score of 500 in 1999. Edmonton Public Schools internal District Capital Inspection rated the facility as marginal. The following factors contribute to the marginal rating. The mechanical system and the exterior doors have reached the end of their usable life and need to be replaced. In addition, the steam heating system needs to be converted to hot water heating, and the washrooms and lighting are in need of upgrading. As such, Grovenor School poses no immediate threat to the health and safety of students. Since 1990, records indicate that Facilities Services and the school have cumulatively spent \$322,255 on modifications and upgrades. Highlights include \$122,700 spent on replacing windows in 1993 and \$31,024 on upgrading electrical panels and classroom outlets.



## **Current and Future Residential Development**


A review of the City of Edmonton's residential development permit applications for the period of May 1, 2005 until November 12, 2006 indicate that a permit for a four unit dwelling in Grovenor has been applied for. A further review of applications in McQueen failed to indicate any applications for development permits. The City of Edmonton has advised that there is a proposal for a (DC2) Site Specific Developmental Control Provision east of 142 Street and north of 102 Avenue that would allow for mixed use development and approximately 325 units. The proposal includes two storey commercial building, town homes and a mix of apartments of varying heights up to 18 stories. This project is in the "pre-application" phase and while a formal application is expected within three to four weeks, the proposal could change upon submission. This proposal has not been approved by City Council.

### BACKGROUND INFORMATION FOR THE HIGH PARK SCHOOL SUSTAINABILITY REVIEW

### Rationale for Inclusion of High Park School for a Sustainability Review

When a district comparison of school profiles was completed, most schools met more benchmarks than High Park School, and the margin between the actual numbers at High Park School and the benchmarks was greater than at most district schools. Based on this analysis it was determined that High Park School faced many challenges and needed to be reviewed as part of a Sustainability Review. The benchmarks that were not met were student enrolment and the population of students living in the attendance area. Enrolment data indicates that 90 students have enrolled for the 2006/2007 year including 61 mainstream students. Less than 25 per cent of students living in the High Park School attendance area attend High Park School. Sixty-five per cent of High Park School is being utilized according to the provincial formula for calculating school utilization. The facility information and condition section shows a score of 690 on the 1999 Provincial Facility Audit Score, and a rating of acceptable on the recent District Capital Inspections. There are only two other schools in the surrounding area with available space. High Park's School Profile is attached as Appendix I.







## Rationale for Inclusion of Lendrum School for a Program Fit Review

When a district comparison of school profiles was completed, most schools met more benchmarks than Lendrum School, and the margin between the actual numbers at Lendrum School and the benchmarks was greater than at most district schools. Based on this analysis it was determined that Lendrum School faced many challenges and needed to be reviewed as part of a Sustainability Review. Lendrum School Enrolment data indicates that 112 students have enrolled for the 2006/2007 year including 77 mainstream students. A little less than 60 per cent of students living in the Lendrum attendance area attend Lendrum School. Fifty-six per cent of Lendrum School is being utilized according to the provincial formula for calculating school utilization. The facility information and condition section shows a score of 320 on the 1999 Provincial Facility Audit Score, and a rating of acceptable on the recent District Capital Inspections. There are four other schools in the surrounding area with available space. Lendrum's School Profile is attached as Appendix I.

The next section of this handbook will take a closer look at Lendrum School and how the school interfaces in the surrounding area and in the district. The intent is to provide as much information as possible about the school in order to make decisions for the future.

Lendrum School students do not have 4 other options for elementary schools, even though there are 4 schools within a 1.6 km radius. The South LRT will restrict access to at least 1 of these schools. In practical, real terms Lendrum School meets the Location and Accessibility benchmark. The school building has advantages and unique amenities, many of which have not been considered in the Facility Audit Scores. Parent and community volunteers expend time and energy equivalent to a full-time staff member. The commitment of these volunteers to the success of students forms a strong connection between the community and the school. A valuable partnership with Avalon Junior High exists, enhancing student learning for both elementary and junior high students. Both schools cultivate opportunities for connection. Lendrum School students have a wealth of opportunities for extra-curricular involvement. The number of clubs is vast and the participation rate in the activities is high. The culture of

Lendrum School actively integrates students in special programs. Many children in regular programs know some sign language and are able to communicate with Total Communication students.





The following factors contribute to the acceptable rating. The mechanical system and windows have reached the end of their usable life and are in need of replacement. As such, Lendrum School poses no immediate threat to the health and safety of students. Since 1990, records indicate that Facilities Services and the school have cumulatively spent \$463,918 on modifications and upgrades. Highlights include \$110,700 spent on reroofing in 1992 and in 1995 \$38,750 on upgrading lighting.



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

When a district comparison of school profiles was completed, most schools met more benchmarks than Mill Creek School, and the margin between the actual numbers at Mill Creek School and the benchmarks was greater than at most district schools. Based on this analysis it was determined that Mill Creek School faced many challenges and needed to be reviewed as part of a Sustainability Review. Mill Creek School Enrolment data indicates that 148 students have enrolled for the 2006/2007 year including 130 in the International Spanish Academy and 18 in the regular program. Less than 50 per cent of students living in the Mill Creek attendance area attend Mill Creek School. Less than 40 per cent of Mill Creek School is being utilized according to the provincial formula for calculating school utilization. The facility information and condition section shows a score of 210 on the 1999 Provincial Facility Audit Score, and a rating of poor on the recent District Capital Inspections. 





## **Current and Future Residential Development**

A review of the City of Edmonton's development permit applications for the period of May 1, 2005 until November 12, 2006 indicate that there were applications for 2 units of three dwelling row housing residential developments in the neighbourhood of Ritchie. The City of Edmonton has advised that there is a rezoning application for a (DC2) Site Specific Development Control Provision proposed North of 66 Avenue and east of 96 Street to accommodate the development of medium density and assisted living senior's housing with the adjacent row housing development. There is an additional 367 row housing units existing on the property. This application has not been approved by City Council and therefore is subject to change.



#### BACKGROUND INFORMATION FOR THE RITCHIE SCHOOL SUSTAINABILITY REVIEW

#### Rationale for Inclusion of Ritchie School for a Sustainability Review

When a district comparison of school profiles was completed, most schools met more benchmarks than Ritchie School, and the margin between the actual numbers at Ritchie School and the benchmarks was greater than at most district schools. Based on this analysis it was determined that Ritchie School faced many challenges and needed to be reviewed as part of a Sustainability Review. Specifically, Ritchie School Enrolment data indicates that 139 students have enrolled for the 2006/2007 year including 86 in the regular program. Less than one third of students living in the Ritchie attendance area attend Ritchie School. Twenty per cent of Ritchie School is being utilized according to the provincial formula for calculating school utilization. The facility information and condition section shows a score of 230 on the 1999 Provincial Facility Audit Score, and a rating of marginal on the recent District Capital Inspections. There are five other schools in the surrounding area with available space. Ritchie's School Profile is attached as Appendix I.

The next section of this report will take a closer look at Ritchie School and how the school interfaces in the surrounding area and in the district. The intent is to provide as much information as possible about the school in order to make decisions for the future.







## Facility Condition

Ritchie School received a provincial facility audit score of 230 in 1999. Edmonton Public Schools internal District Capital Inspection rated the facility as 'marginal'. The following factors contribute to the marginal rating. The mechanical system, washrooms, flooring, exterior doors, and windows have all reached the end of their usable life and need to be replaced. In addition, the lighting and fire alarm system need to be upgraded. As such, Ritchie School poses no threat to the health and safety of students. Since 1990, records indicate that Facilities Services and the school have cumulatively spent \$298,033 on modifications and upgrades. Highlights include \$86,800 spent on re-roofing area # 2 in 1991 and in 2004 \$33,138 on upgrading some lighting.


Ritchie School is located on non-reserve land, which the district owns, with no other school facility adjacent to the site.

A portion of the playground at Ritchie School was recently built. The second half is still waiting for construction to begin and the funds to be raised through an upcoming casino.

## LOCATION, ACCESIBILITY AND SECTOR INFORMATION

Ritchie School is located in the South Central Sector that includes mature neighbourhoods and new and developing neighbourhoods. A map of the South Central Sector is attached as Appendix II.

- There are three other schools located in the South Central Sector that are also undergoing Sustainability or Program Fit Reviews. They are Lendrum, Mill Creek, and Mount Pleasant Schools.
- There are five schools in a 1.6 km radius where student learning space is available. They are Hazeldean, King Edward, Mill Creek, Queen Alexandra and Rutherford.
- There are 5,758 elementary and junior high students living in South Central Sector.
- There are 16,666 provincially rated student spaces in South Central Sector.
- Ninety per cent of students living in this sector are enrolled at schools located in South Central Sector, and ten per cent are enrolled outside the sector at their designated receiving school, or at other schools offering regular and district alternative and special education programs.
- Fifty-two per cent of students enrolled in South Central Sector live outside of the sector.
- Major capital investment in South Central Sector schools will be contingent upon confirmation of their long-term viability.



#### **Current and Future Residential Development**

A review of the City of Edmonton's development permit applications for the period of May 1, 2005 until November 12, 2006 indicate that there were applications for 2 units of three dwelling row housing residential developments in the neighbourhood of Ritchie. In addition, Hazeldean has a single permit application to construct a semi detached house on the site of a single detached house. There are permit applications for a 20 dwelling apartment and 14 dwelling apartment in Strathcona.

The City of Edmonton has advised that there is a rezoning application for a (DC2) Site Specific Development Control Provision proposed North of 66 Avenue and east of 96 Street to accommodate the development of medium density and assisted living senior's housing with the adjacent row housing development. There is an additional 367 row housing units existing on the property. There is a rezoning application for (DC2) Site Specific Development Control Provision west of 101 Street and north of 83 Avenue to accommodate a four storey apartment building with approximately 24 residential units. These applications have not been approved by City Council and therefore are subject to change.




The playground at Montrose School was built within the last five years. In addition to the playground, Montrose School is located is close proximity to the community hall and rink.



# BACKGROUND INFORMATION FOR THE MOUNT PLEASANT SCHOOL PROGRAM FIT REVIEW

## Rationale for Inclusion of Mount Pleasant School for a Program Fit Review

When a district comparison of school profiles was completed, most schools met more benchmarks than Mount Pleasant School, and the margin between the actual numbers at Mount Pleasant School and the benchmarks was greater than at most district schools. Based on this analysis it was determined that Mount Pleasant School faced many challenges and needed to be reviewed as part of a Program Fit Review. Mount Pleasant School Enrolment data indicates that 391 students have enrolled for the 2006/2007 year including 61 mainstream students. Less than 50 per cent of students living in the Mount Pleasant attendance area attend Mount Pleasant School. There are four other schools in the surrounding area with available space. Mount Pleasant's School Profile is attached as Appendix I.

The next section of this report will take a closer look at Mount Pleasant School and how the school interfaces in the surrounding area and in the district. The intent is to provide as much information as possible about the school in order to make decisions for the future.









#### Facility Condition

Mount Royal School received a provincial facility audit score of 720 in 1999 and received a marginal to acceptable score during the 2004 provincial re-audit. Edmonton Public Schools internal District Capital Inspection rated the facility as marginal. The following factors contribute to the marginal rating. The mechanical system, flooring and roof have reached the end of their usable life and need to be replaced. In addition, the electrical system, specifically the light fixtures and fire code system need to be upgraded. As such, Mount Royal School poses no immediate threat to the health and safety of students. Since 1990, records indicate that Facilities Services and the school have cumulatively spent \$641,113 on modifications and upgrades. Highlights include \$283,774 spent on replacing windows in 2003 and in 2004 \$49,497 on upgrading washrooms.

#### Community Use

Mount Royal School does not provide evening community access because it is a one custodian school and there are no tenants leasing space in the facility. There is a lack of availability for community use in the neighbourhood because surrounding schools are also single custodial schools.

#### Site Conditions and Amenities

Mount Royal School is located on non-reserve land, which the district owns, with no other school facility adjacent to the site.


The playground at Mount Royal School was originally built in 1965. The playground structure is of an old basis design and made of pressure treated wood. Treated wood has been phased out from playgrounds due to release of toxic gases. Tires and metal slides are also being phased out. The land adjacent to the school site owned by the City of Edmonton has a playground structure that is in good condition. Mount Royal School is fundraising to replace the playground equipment to provide the students and community with new facilities and has a goal to raise \$74,000.

In addition to the playground equipment Mount Royal School has an outdoor basketball net and tarmac with hopscotch games painted on the surface. Students enjoy recess activities with additional balls and skipping ropes provided by our parent council.

# LOCATION, ACCESIBILITY AND SECTOR INFORMATION

Mount Royal School is located in the North East Sector that includes mature neighbourhoods and new and developing neighbourhoods. A map of the North East Sector is attached as Appendix II.

- There are two other schools located in the North East Sector that are also undergoing Sustainability Reviews. They are Montrose School and Newton School.
- There are five schools in a 1.6 km radius where student learning space is available. They are Beacon Heights, Highlands, Lawton, Montrose and Newton.

- Seventy-four per cent of students living in this sector are enrolled at schools located in North East Sector, and twenty-six per cent are enrolled outside the sector at their designated receiving school, or at other schools offering regular and district alternative and special education programs.

- Major capital investment in North East Sector schools will be contingent upon confirmation of their long-term viability.



#### BACKGROUND INFORMATION FOR THE NEWTON SCHOOL SUSTAINABILITY REVIEW

#### Rationale for Inclusion of Newton School for a Sustainability Review

When a district comparison of school profiles was completed, most schools met more benchmarks than Newton School, and the margin between the actual numbers at Newton School and the benchmarks was greater than at most district schools. Based on this analysis it was determined that Newton School faced many challenges and needed to be reviewed as part of a Sustainability Review. Specifically, Newton School Enrolment data indicates that 112 students have enrolled for the 2006/2007 year including 55 mainstream students. Less than 42 per cent of students living in the Newton School attendance area attend Newton School. Forty-two per cent of Newton School is being utilized according to the provincial formula for calculating school utilization. The facility information and condition section shows a score of 290 on the 1999 Provincial Facility Audit Score, but a rating of poor on the recent District Capital Inspections. There are four other schools in the surrounding area with available space. Newton's School Profile is attached as Appendix I.

The next section of this report will take a closer look at Newton School and how the school interfaces in the surrounding area and in the district. The intent is to provide as much information as possible about the school in order to make decisions for the future.





The following factors contribute to the poor rating. The mechanical system, washrooms, flooring and exterior doors have reached the end of their usable life and need to be replaced. In addition, the steam heating system needs to be converted to hot water heating, and the washrooms fixtures and exterior building finish are in need of upgrading. As such, Newton School poses no immediate threat to the health and safety of students. Since 1990, records indicate that Facilities Services and the school have cumulatively spent \$577,774 on modifications and upgrades. Highlights include \$165,100 spent on replacing windows in 1991 and in 2004 \$172,009 on reroofing area # 1.


