Program Distribution Trends for Alternative Programs

- Academic Alternative has demonstrated a decrease as many more students at Crestwood are now being identified as Challenge in the transition from the Academic Alternative program.
- Arabic Bilingual has demonstrated a significant increase due to new immigration to Edmonton.
- Cogito Program Choice has seen significant increase over the past five years. New sites were established for September 2006 to meet this increase in demand.
- Growth in French Immersion in conjunction with French Renewal Project. New sites were added in the North and South for September 2006
- Decline in enrolment at Millwoods Christian due to Home Education students now enrolling at Argyll Centre Terrace Heights Campus.

Considerations for the Distribution of Alternative Programs

New alternative programs to the district are approved by the Board of Trustees. Many factors including demand, availability of student space, condition of facility, program integrity and transportation are considered in the process for the distribution of approved alternative programs. Consultation with principals, school staff parents and central staff are integral to the implementation of alternative programs and occur frequently during the establishment process. All factors considered are dependent upon final approval by the Superintendent of Schools.

Demand

- Alignment between program location and where students live supports program growth.
- A program's first location placed as close to the centre of demand as space allows.
- When the capacity at an existing location is inadequate to accommodate the demand, the program expands or relocates.
- Once the first site is well established, a second site is introduced based on a review of home addresses in the first site and new public requests.

Facility Condition and Student Space

- When the capacity at an existing location is inadequate to accommodate the demand, the program expands or relocates.
- Adequate capacity must be available in the core facility including future utilization availability
- Student access to facilities that are in the best condition

• Minimal facility modifications, as needed

Transportation

- Alignment between program location and where students live minimizes students' ride time
- Availability of service and related costs

Program Integrity

- Support of Principal, staff and parents
- Specific school administration and teaching staff expertise.
- Minimum two classes per grade model is optimal

Program Compatibility

- Locations are placed in operating schools, i.e. dual or triple-track approach.
- Local factors specific to a school, such as the viability of the regular program, are considered.

Program Continuity

- Continuity between elementary, junior high and senior high programs is an important consideration in parents'/students' program choices.
- Transition rates may increase when locations are twinned, or when the program is continuous at one location, i.e. kindergarten to grade nine.

Summary of the distribution of alternative programs currently proposed to open in September, 2007. Any new recommendation will be made to the Superintendent prior to the end of February 2007, to support schools participation in the pre-enrolment process. No programs are planned for relocation at this time, however, the outcomes of the Sustainability and Program Fit Reviews may see the relocation or further distribution of existing alternative programs.

Cogito

Demand is being explored for an Elementary Cogito Alternative program location on the North side of the river.

Logos

Sakaw School was approved as site for the Logos alternative program at elementary in Millwoods. Due to low enrolment the program was not offered at that time. Advertisement of this location will commence to open in September 2007.

Pre-Advanced Placement

Four school locations were approved to train teachers and gather resources for 2006/2007 school year. These four locations are pending final approval from the Superintendent to open in September 2007. These locations include Kate Chegwin, J.D. Bracco, Mary Butterworth and S. Bruce Smith junior high schools.

Spanish Bilingual

J.A. Fife School was approved as a Spanish Bilingual location for elementary on the North Side of the city in September 2006. Due to low enrolment the program was not offered at that time. Advertisement of this location will commence to open in September 2007.

New Alternatives

No requests for new alternatives were received from the community or district staff. Consequently, no new alternatives are planned for September 2007. However, it is anticipated that a number of the current alternatives will evolve to new sites and growth is expected in the alternatives introduced last year (Science elementary alternative and Pre-Advanced Placement).

Charter and Private Schools

The district, through various strategies, stays in contact with most of the charter and private schools in Edmonton. They are aware that the district is open to discussions regarding alternative program status in the district. Because successful partnerships with such schools requires that they believe it is the right choice for them, the district responds to their requests rather then pursuing them. Over the past decade, it has had discussions with Suzuzki Charter School, Edmonton Islamic School and Headway private school. In all cases, the groups were advised that discussions could be continued at any time upon their request.

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
