School Philosophy

Outreach Programs has three components: Learning Stores, LearnWrite and New Directions/Transitions. Outreach Programs provides individualized academic programs, personal support and employment assistance to students. Students undertake their learning 'one course at a time'. A student selects a course that fits with their Learning and Career plan and then they proceed learning at a pace they choose and after having consulted with their teacher, ensuring certain minimum guidelines and expectations (e.g. pace of progress and attendance) are met.

Community Profile

Our four The Learning Stores (Blue Quill, Northgate, West Edmonton and Whyte Avenue) serve students in all four quadrants of the city.

The New Directions program has two locations: Blue Quill and Park Plaza. The New Directions program provides '1 to 1' teaching to high school students who have been expelled from district high schools.

The LearnWrite program is a partnership between Outreach Programs and Edmonton Public high schools. This program supports high school students who need greater program flexibility and increased choice to increase the opportunity for academic success and successful completion of high school.

Programs and Organization

The Learning Stores provide high school level support and intervention to students throughout the city and for those who are at risk of not completing high school. As well, students attending a regular high school can also register for a course through Outreach Programs.

LearnWrite is a partnership between Outreach and the Edmonton Public high schools. This program is part of a district wide initiative to improve student graduation and successful course completion rates.

New Directions provides programming to high school students directed their by the Superintendent as a result of the student having gone through the expulsion process.

School Community Relationships

Community supports play an important role in the success of our students. At this time our school does not have partnerships we are able to share publicly.

By June of 2024, students at the Learning Stores will be more empowered and demonstrate greater competency in meeting the needs of a changing society, workforce, and climate. Achievement of this goal will be supported by:

- Providing unparalleled service to our students and their ever-changing needs. This includes expanding access to institutes/services that can help students
 achieve their long-term goals.
- Emphasizing career and life pathways by utilizing community supports: Campus EPSB and CAREERS: The Next Generation and expanding student access to these opportunities.
- Having all grade 12 students meet with the AP to create a plan for completion of high school.
- Staff engaging in PD to support the best practices used to teach different areas of the curriculum to ensure students are receiving the best possible instruction.
- To support learning beyond high school, staff will focus on teaching students how to learn instead of what they are learning.
- The development of CTS modules that will prepare students for post high school.
- Teachers meeting with students in grade 10 and 11 and using evidence from assessments and modular work to evaluate alignment and determine if adjustments are required.
- Students working alongside teachers to determine when they are ready to demonstrate their knowledge in the manner that they feel most confident.

Results Achieved:

Over the past 3 years, our Outreach program has grown from 277 full registrations to 457 registrations. As of September 30, 2024, we currently sit at 480 registrations. In past years, we have been able to assist 80% of our 4th year + students earn their high school diplomas. We continue to support our FNMI students in multiple ways. Additionally, our overall graduation rate has averaged 74% over the past 3 years. Last year, we were slightly below at 72%. Many of those who didn't make it, have returned to us this year. Last year, 10% of our graduates were FNMI students. We also had a 25% increase in FNMI student registrations. That number has increased again this year.

By June of 2024, students at the Learning Stores will feel greater support and enhanced educational experiences. Achievement of this goal will be supported by:

- Continuing to provide unparalleled service to our students and their ever-changing needs. We look beyond 'achieving a diploma' and focus on the long-term picture. In doing so, we create a school community that has no ceiling and one in which relationships last well beyond the completion of high school.
- During our intake meetings, we ask students about any barriers that they may have previously encountered in our education system.
- Providing intake surveys for our grade 12 / third year + students to obtain specific information that allows us to assist students in developing a life plan and providing support in achieving their goals.
- Increasing our understanding and compassion to those who have been affected by trauma or systematic racism.
- Expanding self-confidence in our students. We are working to show them that we are not dictating their choices, we are supporting them. We want our students to see their path in life and rely on us to guide them toward it.

Results Achieved:

Since introducing our Grade 12 Intentions & Needs Intake survey 3 years ago, 100% of our students in their 3rd, 4th and 5th year of school have met with our AP. Information that was gained in the survey and/or one-on-one meetings was shared with staff to help support the goals of our students. In the 2023/2024 school year, over 360 one-on-one meetings were held with students. These meetings provided staff with the information necessary to adjust course selections; thereby ensuring that graduation requirements and/or post-secondary prerequisites were met. Students were matched with Campus EPSB and other work-related opportunities. Additionally, 15 google meets were set up for students to attend to learn about post secondary programs and institutes, housing opportunities.

mental health supports, funding opportunities, resume writing/interview/job search. One-on-one meetings with students were provided to support all referrals to outside agencies and registering for Campus EPSB or CAREERS initiatives. Overall, implementation of this survey provided staff with necessary information to support students in achieving their life goals.

What were the biggest challenges encountered in 2023-2024?

Creating meaningful data often comes from the stories of the students that overcome major barriers to be successful and this is hard to capture with numbers. Additionally, some of the students that come to us have had negative educational experiences in their past. It can be challenging to get these students to change their mindsets that education can open doors and be a positive experience. Out-of-school influences and obstacles can have a negative impact on our students' thoughts and behaviors and their ability to place education as a key priority in their lives.

What are the opportunities for improvement from 2023-2024 that will inform your plan for 2024-2025?

Our staff will continue to find ways to enhance a sense of community and belonging within our student body. We strive to have students understand that they are in charge of their pathway and that we are there to support them. We still have work to do with all of our students, particularly our FNMI students. We continue to look for additional supports and opportunities that are provided by the province and federal government to support our students' graduation and post secondary needs. We will seek opportunities to assist and celebrate those students who earn credits and achieve their goal of entering the workforce.

In reflecting on our work towards continuous improvement as a Division, reflective questions have been included in the Planning Guide as a resource to help inform goal setting: Goals must align with 2022-2026 Division Priorities. All schools are to set two goals with one being in support of Priority 1. Schools also have the flexibility of setting an optional third goal. Division Priority 1

By June of 2025, students at the Learning Stores will be more empowered and demonstrate greater competency in meeting the needs of a changing society, workforce, and climate. This understanding will allow us to develop strategies and seek out additional resources (at local, provincial, and federal levels). These efforts will yield a minimum 5% increase to 4th and 5th year graduation rates, which currently sit at 80%. 100% of our grade 12 students will meet with our AP and create a high school completion plan. This will ensure that our overall graduation rates increase to a benchmark of 88%. We will also seek opportunities to assist and celebrate those students who earn credits and achieve their goal of entering the workforce.

We will track continuous improvements through the assurance survey, our internal student intentions & needs survey, the number of students attending google meets, the number of referrals to outside agencies, and garnering information from our grad list (tracking the percentage of students completing courses and the number of credits earned).

Division Priority 3

By June of 2025, students at the Learning Stores will demonstrate growth in their sense of sense of belonging and connection to school. An increase in our total school registrations and requests from other schools about students taking courses with us. We will see an increase in weekly attendance and course completion rates. Our FNMI student registration numbers will continue to increase as we work to make our students feel increasingly safe and welcome at our sites. Courses consist of a series of modules, and it is expected that at least one module of work will be completed each week with teacher guidance and coaching.
